EDUCATE AND PREVENT DIABETES!

Hi, my name is Tomasz Mrowca and I have Type 1 Diabetes. I want to tell you a few things about diabetes. We have two types. Type 1 is for the rest of your life and you have to take injections every day. Some people take injections at every meal and some take them every morning and evening. It depends on the type of insulin. Type 2 is diabetes that you don't have to take injections for but you might need tablets. Sometimes people don't have to

take the tablets but they have to check their sugar level and they have to keep to a diet. I am going to tell you about insulin. We have to take insulin so our sugar levels don't go too high. If we take too much insulin then the sugar level will go down and we can shake, feel dizzy and sometimes even pass out. We have to take care of our arms, legs and weight. Sometimes I like to have low sugar because I can have a sweet! But not always! We can't

eat very many sweets because our sugar level will be too high. Every meal we have to count our carbohydrate so we know how much insulin we have to get. Hope you understand me now and

learned something about diabetes!

I think we have to use a lot of electricity for


learning - it is important to have lots of light and the computers are always on. Interactive whiteboards are great but they use up a lot of electricity.
